Christmas 1894 in Y Twr “Pwllheli, Currants and turnips”.

Pwllheli once celebrated Christmas in much more creative ways than we see today. It wasn't the lights or the shopping and grotto that created the excitement, but the little unexpected things that filled the Stryd Fawr in Pwllheli.

One gem from the archive is an advert for Tower Stores, opposite the Hotel, praising their “clean currants” as something unbeatable. Currants making the headlines? Who would've thought. Where else but Pwllheli!

The highlight of Christmas 1894 in Pwllheli was the town's Turnip Exhibition that was held in front of the hotel. Farmers from the area came to proudly display their produce, and Mr D H Parry of Penllwyn won with twenty-four turnips weighing almost four hundred pounds. Y Faner newspaper reported that the exhibition was one of the best they had ever witnessed. It is easy to imagine the crowd gathering and watching the weighing and measuring of the turnips as if they were pearls.

Though life has changed so much, stories like these remind us that Christmas in Pwllheli has always been a mix of humour, pride, and a sense of community —and long may that continue!
