The wonderful legacy of Gwesty'r Tŵr

One of Menter y Tŵr's volunteers is Robin-Rhys Jones who is very interested in the old history of the building. He has a valuable collection of stories and newspaper clippings and is eager to share some of the stories with us.

Since its official opening in 1877, the hotel has stood not only as an impressive building in the center of Pwllheli, but as a stage for some of the town's most memorable stories - some dramatic and others harrowing.

The hotel was formally opened on 9 January 1877 in a grand ceremony presided over by the High Sheriff of Caernarfon County, Mr R. Carreg. Among the special guests were Mr H. T. Richardson (the Army), Mr Francis (the Navy), and Dr T. Hunter Hughes (the Volunteers), with the Mayor of Pwllheli, Mr R. Owen Jones, as vicechairman. A toast was raised to Lord Newborough, and there was much celebration. It was said that he was responsible for promoting this "noble and large" building, and that he helped solve one of the town's main problems at the time - the lack of suitable accommodation for visitors. A very common problem for what is facing us today!


By 1886, the hotel was attracting royal connections. Indeed Browne, Holmes & Description of Wales, to Hold a fashion exhibition from Paris at the hotel.

In 1900, a meeting was held on the site of the hotel to establish the Pwllheli Golf Club, with enthusiastic support from Solomon Andrews & Done — a development that would strengthen the town's leisure and social provision which continues to this day.

The hotel was also a center for agricultural developments. In 1922, the annual meeting of the Caernarfon and Anglesey County Milk Recording Association was held in Y Tŵr. Under the chairmanship of Professor R. G. White from Bangor, the performance of herds, butter fat testing, and calf marking were discussed - signs of modern agriculture based on data and science.

But not all stories celebrated success. In 1968, the hotel became the scene of a serious incident. Margaret Barrett, a 31-yearold member of staff, set fire to her bedroom in the hotel just after being given a week's notice following a change in management. She returned to the building that evening and, after a quick chat with a colleague, warned them: "Don't let them sleep here." Shortly afterwards, thick smoke rose from the top floor. Miss Joan Griffith tried to run upstairs, but was stopped by the smoke. The fire service was called, and by 11.20 that night, Mrs Barrett had walked to Pwllheli Police Station and announced: "I set the place on fire." The damage was estimated to cost between £4,500 and £5,000. At the High Sheriff's Court in Caernarfon, her good character and hard work were

recognised and she was given three years probation, with the condition that she would spend a year in North Wales Hospital, Denbigh.

From royal fashion to scientific farming, from sports to profound stories, Y Tŵr has been at the heart of Pwllheli's history for almost 150 years - not just a building, but a living archive of what has shaped the town and its people.
